LOOKING FOR LATINO REGULARS ON PRIME-TIME TELEVISION: THE FALL 2002 SEASON

n any given night of the week between 8:00 and 11:00 p.m., prime-time television programming can be seen lagging behind U.S. social realities. Its failure to include minorities in regular roles that reflect the plurality of the American public grows visibly more dramatic every year. In the 2002 season fall line-up (see fig. 1), the vast majority of network, primetime, regular characters were white and only 4% were Latino (see fig. 2). Yet, nationally, Latinos make up 13% of the U.S. population, three times their representation on television, making them among the most underrepresented minority groups on television.

More significantly, over one-third of prime-time television series have no minority regular characters at all. As such, minority regulars are concentrated on relatively few shows and within only a few genres (see figs. 3 and 4). This concentration by genre reveals some disturbing trends in the representation of race on television. While past studies of race on prime-time television have calculated minority representation based on the employment of and the screen-time given to minority actors, this study examines the presence of minority regular characters (MRCs) and Latino regular characters (LRCs) in television's top ten genres. What is the fictional world created on prime-time television series with—or without—minority characters?

After all, characters and genres are tools for audiences to navigate today's complex mediascape. They offer recognizable visual elements, plot conventions, and faces. Series regulars—that is, prime-time programs' central characters, whose names and/or faces appear in opening credits—are those "with whom audience members connect when they tune in week after week" (Hunt 2002, 7). They include hosts

of news programs and reality series. Similarly, "genre helps to frame audience expectations" (Turner 2001, 5). Of course, on contemporary television genres often overlap. For example, *Scrubs*, is both a situation-comedy and a medical-themed series, which are usually dramas. Nevertheless, generic conventions, features, and stylistic techniques remain strong, allowing us to identify ten genre categories (see fig. 3).

The internet has served as our primary source for and index of genre and character information. The networks' web-sites (abc.com, nbc.com, cbs.com, upn.com, fox.com, and thewb.com) provided such information as well as an interpretive framework. Other sources included Yahoo!TV and, in the absence of sufficient on-line or in print information about series' casts, viewing of episodes during October and November 2002 in order to determine the presence of MRCs.

FINDINGS

Our findings suggest that minority representation on prime-time television has a strong genre component. Latino regular characters or hosts are missing from six of the top ten genres: sketch/variety, animation, teen, medical, news, and reality. Overall, LRCs account for just 4% of prime-time regular characters (27 roles out of a possible 649) (see fig. 2). LRCs are represented at a higher rate in just two genres: police-crime-detective (6%) and situation-comedies (7%). In neither case are Latinos represented anywhere near their national demographics, let alone their much larger presence in the urban settings typical of these two genres. Although the two Latino-themed

series account for less than 2% of the total prime-time series in the Fall 2002 line-up, these two sit-coms account for 44% of Latino characters on all prime-time television. In other words, nearly half of all Latino characters on prime-time television can be found on two half-hour series out of a total of 108 series broadcast in Fall 2002.

Furthermore, American Indian and Middle Eastern regular characters are completely absent from the screen. Asian American representation is also marginal: there is not one Asian American-themed program on prime-time and only twelve Asian American regular characters total (three of whom are animated and one of whom is a non-speaking dancer). While Black regular characters are the most predominant non-white characters on screen, their overall representation remains minimal and is highly gender-stratified. Often the black male character is the only MRC operant within a genre or series.

LATINOS ON PRIME-TIME TELEVISION BY GENRE

SKETCH / VARIETY

While the MRC percentage (MRCP) of this genre is high at 65%, it makes up only 2% of prime-time hours. It is tied with "animation" for the least amount of programming hours on prime-time. Furthermore, while this genre contains the largest percentage of minorities, it has no LRCs. Indeed, the genre's high MRCP is

largely determined by FOX's black-themed Cedric the Entertainer, whose high MRCP is in turn determined by six non-speaking regulars, Cedric's "fly girls."

MEDICAL

All of the shows in this genre feature MRCs, but none are Latino. Furthermore, medical-themed shows make up a small number of prime-time hours—only 4%. Additionally, with the exception of the comedy *Scrubs*, these shows air at the edge of prime-time, during the later "adult" slots after 10 p.m. when audiences are smaller.

NEWS AND REALITY

All hosts in the reality genre are white. There are no Latino hosts or reporters during prime-time. Furthermore, 57% of news programs feature only white hosts and reporters (both lead and associate). In other words, there are very few MRCs.

ANIMATION

This genre has a MRCP of 22%, but none are Latino. This is particularly striking since the typical excuse of television executives for the lack of minority representation on primetime is a lack of talented or named minority actors. Obviously, in the category of animation this excuse does not apply, and yet the exclusion is pronounced.

POLICE-CRIME-DETECTIVE

This genre has the most MRCs with the most exposure since it is the genre with the most prime-time hours. Its MRCP is 29% with a relatively high LRCP (6%) compared to all other genres (with the exception of the situation-comedy). However, programs with the highest MRCP screen after 10:00 p.m. (with the exception of NBC's Boomtown) and the program with the lowest MRCP airs at 8:00 p.m. That is, the only series without any minority regulars, JAG, is also the only crime show with an early air-time. While the multiracial casts of this genre may seem promising, police-crime-detective shows remain white-centered, both in theme and cast.

Given that the majority of the shows are set in large U.S. cities where whites are becoming the minority (including Los Angeles), the low number of MRCs in this genre is a conspicuous failure to reflect current realities.

SITUATION COMEDIES

This popular genre, with almost as many prime-time hours as the police-crimedetective genre, does have a relatively better MRCP (26%) and LRCs are at their highest percentage (7%). However, this genre is, by far, the most segregated. Nearly half (49%) of the shows are completely white (18). Family-themed sit-coms, in particular, are highly segregated (with the exception of Hidden Hills) while work-themed shows present more instances of racial integration. The high percentage of Latinos in this genre is a result of two recent Latino-themed situation-comedies, The George Lopez Show and Greetings from Tucson. A cancellation of one or both of these shows would almost erase Latinos from the genre and from prime-time television.

SCI-FI/FANTASY

This genre also has a relatively high MRCP (27%) and LRCP (3%), but it makes up only 7% of prime-time hours. Furthermore, the majority of the shows screen on the lesserwatched networks (like WB and UPN). With Forest Whitaker as the host of *The Twilight Zone*, this genre has the only non-white host on network prime-time. Unfortunately, MRCs are almost always used to represent an alien Other against a predominantly white native population.

DRAMA

Although drama is the genre with the third most prime-time hours, it has a low MRCP (17%) and a low LRCP (2%). It is also a segregated genre in that 22% of the shows are *completely* white.

TEEN

All shows in this genre are white-themed. Its MRCP is low (7%) with no Latino char-

acters and one Latino actor on FOX's *That* 70s *Show* whose racial identity is left ambiguous. It is interesting to note that teen shows, which address the American age group that is most diverse, are among the least diverse.

CONCLUSION

Although the portrayal of minorities on television has been researched, the pattern of minority absences has not received enough attention. By overlapping the study of race with the study of television genre, one finds that minority regular characters are missing from whole genres or are concentrated in genres without much prime-time presence. Thus, it is not enough for researchers to count heads, they must examine where and when minorities are appearing on television.

The Latino population is now the largest minority group in the United States, accounting for 13% of the national population. Its proportion in the western United States is even more dramatic, nearly onethird of California and the plurality of Los Angeles (45%). Yet, while located in L.A., prime-time television turns its cameras away from the city's largest ethnic/racial group and presents a fictional world without Latinos. To what purpose? What can, and will, be gained by continuing this fantasy on prime-time? The viewing landscape of prime-time television is in urgent need of a more consistent inclusion of Latino and other minority regular characters.
