LOOKING FOR LATINO REGULARS ON PRIME-TIME TELEVISION: THE FALL 2003 SEASON

Latinos now comprise the largest minority group in the country, yet register as the most underrepresented group in prime-time.

75% of prime-time's regular characters are white and 85% of shows do not include Latino regular characters. Though more minorities appear on prime-time this year, the number of Latino characters has remained constant.

ast year the UCLA Chicano Studies Research Center issued its first annual study of race and genre on prime-time television's Fall 2002 season (Hoffman 2003). This year our report provides an update by looking at the Fall 2003 line-up of programs on the six commercial networks: ABC, CBS, FOX, NBC, UPN, WB (see fig. 1).

Overall, network prime-time programs include more minority characters than last year (172 or 24.8% of all characters in 2003, versus 151 or 23.3% in 2002). But for Latinos, opportunities have not improved. Latinos make up 13% of the U.S. population and now represent the largest minority group. But the number of Latino regular characters remains nearly constant, at around 4%. White characters account for over 75% of all roles on prime-time television and can be found on 95% of all prime-time series, while Latinos remain highly segregated on the programming schedule, appearing on only 15% of series and on just 5 out of 12 genres (see figs. 2 and 3).

METHODOLOGY

Our study examines race as it is depicted on-screen through regular characters on individual programs and within genres. We do not consider the ways in which the networks hire program creators and actors.¹ Instead, we measure the extent to which television represents the nation's ethnic and racial diversity. In focusing on genre and regular characters, we are placing an emphasis on the networks' own promotional and marketing activities. Genres and regular characters are important navigational tools for television audiences since they offer recognizable visual elements, plot conventions, and character types. Indeed, audiences often identify and connect most with series' regular characters, but they also use genre to frame their expectations and guide them in making viewing choices.

While most studies sample series episodes that are broadcast over a two- or three-week period, and then code for representation (by race, occupation, screen time, and so on), our study relies upon the networks' own promotional information. In particular, we use the local web pages for each series. These pages are uniform across all networks and include a banner photograph of the regular characters and a "bio," "cast," or "people" page with additional material on the characters/actors. Information was gathered in July and August 2003. For series in which the web pages provided

inconclusive information, we then viewed the series' title sequence during the first month of the Fall season.

This approach places an emphasis on the networks' own self-representations for their series; and, as such, it measures regular characters within both programming and web-based marketing. If we have missed any regular characters, then, the fault could lie with a network's failure to promote the presence of its non-white regulars. Even so, our method is inherently conservative and is likely to produce slightly higher numbers of minority representation than sampling. After all, not all regular characters are created equal, and coding can reveal that some regular characters receive much more screen time than others.

In order to account for this imbalance in the weight given to regular roles, we have categorized series according to their racial theme. That is, rather than count the number of appearances by a character, we assess where a series locates it dramatic center *racially*, a point that is often made graphically clear in the series' web pages. To date, such categories have been used in the press to describe Black-cast series, and the recently created Latino-cast series, but never to describe the vast majority of predominantly White-cast series. We offer one possible way of doing so through the following definition. White-themed series are those in which the major central characters are white-and around whom minority regular characters function in more of a supporting role—or in which the storyline revolves around white characters, settings, or themes. Similar distinctions were used to identify Black-, Latino-, and Multiethnic-themed series. The latter is a recent phenomenon insofar as the networks have begun identifying some series as "multiethnic"—for example, Skin and Like Family.

FINDINGS

While sitcoms like *The George Lopez Show* and *Luis* have garnered media attention, and represent important advances in Latino-themed programming, the overall

picture for Latinos has not improved since last year. In fact, looking back at last year's programs, we find that Latino representation on television decreased.

Many of last year's shows that featured LRCs (Latino Regular Characters) have been cancelled (e.g., Greetings from Tucson, Kingpin, Firefly, Sabrina, The *Grubbs*) or, unfortunately, have written off their LRCs (e.g., Good Morning, Miami). Many of this year's shows with LRCs have already disappeared from the screen (see fig. 4). Although FOX can be commended for including more LRCs in their fall programming, the network also shelved a Latino-themed sitcom, The Ortegas, initially planned to air in the fall, in order to provide more airtime for their Whitethemed teen drama, The O.C. Had FOX aired The Ortegas in Fall 2003, an improvement would have easily been seen: there would have been one more Latino-themed show than last year and the LRCP (Latino regular character percentage) would have been 4.6% instead of 4.1%. Without the inclusion of The

Ortegas in the fall line-up, Luis and The George Lopez Show were the only Latinothemed programs. They accounted for 9 out of 28 LRCs, over 30% of the overall LRCP on prime-time. The recent cancellation of Luis reveals the fragility of Latino representation on prime-time and points toward the need for a greater number of LRCs within each and every genre. Moreover, Luis's cancellation calls attention to the tenuous presence of LRCs. Series cancellations resulted in a loss of 10 out of 28 Latino regular characters (or 36%) from the Fall schedule.

Similar to our 2002 findings, this year there remains a glaring absence of LRCs and/or hosts on prime-time in general. Out of 690 regular characters/hosts on prime-time, only 28 are Latinos (13 women and 15 men). This underrepresentation becomes even more dramatic when individual programs are grouped into genres, or "types." This year we have identified 12 distinct genres composed of programs that feature regular characters or hosts. LRCs appear in only 5 of these genres: crime, situation comedy, drama, sci-fi, and sports. Moreover, LRCs are missing from 7 genres: news, reality, teen, variety, animation, musical, and medical. The largest percentage of LRCs can be found in the sports genre (20%), due to the addition of a Latina commentator on ABC's Monday Night Football. A significant percentage of LRCs appear on crime shows (7%) and sitcoms (5.5%)—an encouraging sign insofar as crime shows and sitcoms constitute the two most popular genres, but also a problematic phenomenon in that Latino characterizations are often limited to spaces such as the home and the police station (either as criminals or as cops). The genres of sci-fi (3%) and drama (1.7%) register very small LRCPs. With the exception of sports, Latinos are not represented anywhere near their national demographic of 13%, let alone their much larger presence in the urban settings typical of the other four genres in which Latino regulars appear.

In terms of overall Minority Regular Characters (MRCs) on prime-time, the numbers have slightly increased. MRCs now account for 25% of the total number of prime-time regular characters (171 out of 690), instead of last year's 23.3% (151 out of 649). However, there are slightly fewer programs with MRCs this year, 60% as opposed to last year's 63%. This decrease in programs with MRCs can be accounted for largely by the increase in the number of sitcoms, one of television's most segregated genres. However, the networks can be applauded for their inclusion of their selfconsciously labeled "multiethnic" ensemble cast shows (e.g., 10-8, Like Family, Skin). This year, multiethnic programs compose 7% of prime-time's total series.

Figure 5 presents a breakdown of primetime MRCs based on race/ethnicity and gender. This figure is particularly revealing when considering how creators/directors imagine the U.S. ethnic landscape and, more specifically, what types of people occupy this landscape. Overwhelmingly, black male characters account for the greatest number of MRCs (45%) and black females make up 30.4%. Among Asian American regular characters, there are three times as many women as men. The highest concentration of Asian American women can be found in the sci-fi genre, a racialized pattern on television that can be witnessed since the 1960s. Middle Eastern men appear on two new series this year—ABC's post-9-11 program about a "Homeland Security Agency" battling terrorism, titled *Threat Matrix*, and NBC's sitcom starring Whoopi Goldberg as a New York City hotel owner, *Whoopi*. There were no Middle Eastern female characters and, again this year, there were no American Indian characters.

Finally, the overall MRCP of 25% is shockingly low when one considers that most prime-time programs are set in urban areas with large concentrations of people of color, or areas that are well-known for their ethnic communities. Yet many urban shows are White-themed and often feature few, if any, characters of color. For example, NBC's Karen Sisco is set in Miami and the title character is based on Jennifer Lopez's character in the film Out of Sight, yet there is not one LRC on the show. ABC's nostalgic crime show Dragnet, set in Los Angeles where 45% of the population is Latino, features an all-white cast with no MRCs. Other examples of urban shows with either a non-existent or low MRCP/LRCP include Alias, The Handler, The District, Law & Order, Law & Order SVU, Tarzan, Married to the Kellys, Still Standing, Everybody Loves Raymond, King of Queens, a Minute with Stan Hopper, Arrested Development, Frasier, Good Morning Miami, Friends, Will & Grace, Coupling, Tru Calling, Miss Match, The O.C. and E.R.

A shift in the popularity of genres can also be witnessed this year (see fig. 3).

Crime shows encompass the greatest number of prime-time hours (22.7%) with situation comedies a close second (21.7%); last year these figures were reversed. The presence of the sci-fi genre has significantly decreased (from 7% to 4.9% of prime-time hours), as has the teen show genre (from 5.9% to 3.4%). Reality shows have gained prominence on prime-time this year, while medical dramas have virtually disappeared with only *E.R.* remaining from last year's four medical-themed programs.

LATINOS ON PRIME-TIME TELEVISION BY GENRE

POLICE/CRIME/DETECTIVE

As the most visible genre in Fall 2003, crime series increased this year from 2002 with five more shows (for a total of 23 shows—17 returning and 6 new series). The MRCP and LRCP rates have both increased by 1%, with MRCs accounting for 29% of the genre's regular characters and LRCs making up 7%. Highly gender stratified, this genre features far more men than women, a disparity played out among the genre's LRCs. Of the 10 LRCs, 7 are men and 3 are women. Largely imagined as masculine and white (96% of crime shows are White-themed), network prime-time's crime series often fail to represent the racial and gender plurality of their urban settings. The majority of crime series are set in New York City and Los Angeles, cities that boast Latino populations of 27% and 45%, respectively. Indeed, in 2001 33.4% of Los Angeles Police Department officers were Latino. Why then, do LRCs make up only 7% of the genre's characters? Certain shows within this genre are exceptional for having a larger number of LRCs (10-8 and NYPD Blue). However, ABC's Dragnet and CBS' Navy NCIS feature allwhite regular characters.

SITUATION COMEDIES

Whether family-oriented or occupational, the sitcom occupies a large presence on prime-time (21.7%). Like crime shows, the number of sitcoms has risen this year (44 as opposed to last year's 37).

Unfortunately, there are less LRCs on sitcoms this year (only 5.5%) and as mentioned earlier, one of the two Latinothemed shows on prime-time, Luis, has already been cancelled. Oddly enough, FOX's Luis and ABC's The George Lopez show were also scheduled on the same night of the week (Friday), and at the same time (8:30-9:00 p.m.)! In other words, the networks placed the only Latino-themed shows on prime-time in competition with one another, a recipe that surely would lead to at least one of their cancellations, and subsequently, a drastic decrease in the LRCP. This scheduling decision also decreases audiences' ability to tune into more than one Latino-themed show.

Furthermore, LRCs appear on only 6 out of the 44 sitcoms on prime-time (13.6%). Since the vast majority of sitcoms are set within a domestic space, focusing on racially homogenous families, one of the codes of this genre is segregation, particularly in White-themed sitcoms where race is made to seem invisible or a non-issue. Of sitcoms, 50% feature an all-white cast of regular characters, erasing MRCs from the screen. Conversely, Black- and Latino-themed sitcoms seem to carry the responsibility of addressing race, often making race and interracial relations their primary narrative themes (e.g., Whoopi, Luis, Like Family).

DRAMA

Dramas maintain the lowest LRCP of shows that feature LRCs (1.7%) and suffer from an overall low MRCP (15%). The Fall 2003 season's MRC and LRC figures for this genre have both decreased since last year. In fact, the recently cancelled FOX series Skin, which presented two LRCs, accounted for all of the LRCs within the dramatic genre. With this cancellation, LRCs disappear from the genre. Over 86% of dramas on prime-time are White-themed, and similarly, nearly 27% present only white regular characters (e.g., David E. Kelley's The Brotherhood of Poland, N.H.; Joan of Arcadia; Tru Calling; and 7th Heaven). The only dramatic series that privileges characters of color is FOX's *Boston Public* as it focuses on a public school's minority students and its multiethnic faculty.

NEWS AND REALITY

Just like last year's Fall season, all hosts in the reality genre are white and male (with the exception of *Extreme Makeover*, a show hosted by a white woman).² On primetime news programs, only 12% of hosts are minorities and all are African American (3 men and 1 woman). Since all of the news and reality programs on prime-time this Fall were returning shows, it is particularly surprising that series producers did not add a Latino host or reporter to their shows. The absence of Latinos on both of these genres is especially troubling given that each genre—in its own way—makes a claim to presenting "reality."

SCIENCE FICTION / FANTASY / SUPERNATURAL

Stagnant at 3%, the LRC rate on sci-fi series remains the same as last year. Because the sci-fi genre is a relatively small genre that occupies little screen time (4.9%), the 3% LRCP can be accounted for by one LRC, a male supporting character on UPN's White-themed series Jake 2.0. All White-themed, the five sci-fi shows screen on the lesser-watched networks (the WB and UPN); however, two of these shows have significant and powerful fan cultures (Charmed and Enterprise). As mentioned above, the sci-fi genre features the highest concentration of Asian American female characters; while one of these characters is young Clark Kent's love-interest on Smallville, the other is "Hoshi Sato," an "academic intellectual and expert in exo-linguistics" who is framed against a predominantly white community on Enterprise's StarFleet. The overall MRCP for this genre registers at 24% (8 out of 34 characters).

SPORTS

With only two sports programs in the season's scheduled line-up and five regular commentators, the MRCP (40%) and the LRCP (20%) are at their highest in this genre. ABC's Monday Night Football features

a Latina commentator, sending the LRCP up to an all-time high (20%)—an encouraging figure. UPN's World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) Smackdown regularly stars two commentators, one black ("Tazz") and the other white. Both sports shows offer "multiethnic" racial themes.

TEEN

Disturbingly, just as was the case last year, all of the four teen series are Whitethemed. Furthermore, the already low MRCP in 2002 (6.5%) has decreased in 2003 (to 6%). LRCs remain almost entirely absent in this genre; only one Latino actor appears on FOX's That 70s Show, but his ethnicity is intentionally constructed as a joke. The low MRCP rate in this genre reads as particularly grim and discriminatory when considering that the age group being represented on these shows is the most ethnically diverse in the U.S. population. The whiteness of FOX's popular new teen series The O.C. exemplifies the racial hierarchy within the genre.

SKETCH / VARIETY

As prime-time television has it, Latinos are not funny outside of the situation comedy genre. Although the MRCP of the sketch/variety genre is at its highest (77%), just as was true last year, LRCs are absent. The vast majority (70%) of regular characters within this genre are African American and all can be found on FOX's Cedric the Entertainer.

ANIMATION

Animated series are tied with teen-oriented shows for having the lowest percentage of MRCs (6%). They have maintained their exclusion of LRCs in 2003. Though guest characters who are Latino might be featured on FOX's two animated shows *The Simpsons* and *King of the Hill*—the only two animated series on

prime time—not one LRC is featured on either show. This exclusion illuminates the constructedness of race on television and how "representation" essentially is a matter of choice—a choice made by those who create (or "draw up") and produce what ethnicities will appear on-screen. After all, the creators cannot use the usual argument that there were no qualified actors, since all they would have to do is draw them!

MUSICAL

In the Fall schedule of 2003, only one series falls into the musical genre: *American Juniors*. With a multiethnic theme, though hosted by a white man, its MRCP registers at 33%. LRCs do not appear on this show, and thus, are lacking in the genre's fall line-up. It is interesting to note that a majority of the show's contestants are children of color, yet they cannot be counted as "regular characters" due to the structure of the show and its implicit hierarchies. Contestants, unlike hosts and judges, are coded as "unstable" guests who come and go.

MEDICAL

The number of medical-themed series has been dramatically reduced this year. Whereas last year there were four medical series, this year only *E.R.* remains, leaving the genre with a low prime-time presence of 1%, but a high MRCP (30%). However, like the genres of news and reality, teen, variety, animation, and musical, the medical-themed genre does not feature any LRCs. *E.R.* does represent African American and Asian American regular characters, so why are there no Latino regulars in a series set in a county with a 20% Latino population?

CONCLUSION

While there have been clear improvements in some areas—especially in the rise of Latino- and Multiethnic-themed series—overall, network television offers its viewers

a misleading conception of the nation's ethnic and racial diversity.3 Though Latinos make up 13% of the U.S. population, as regular characters on network prime-time television, their presence amounts to only 4%, making them the most dramatically underrepresented racial /ethnic group on primetime. Through simultaneously examining race and genre on prime-time, we have seen the lack of Latino regular characters across the televisual landscape become even more pronounced. Latinos have yet to exercise a presence across all genres and series: for the past two years, Latino regular characters have been concentrated on less than half of prime-time's genres and on just 15% of series.
