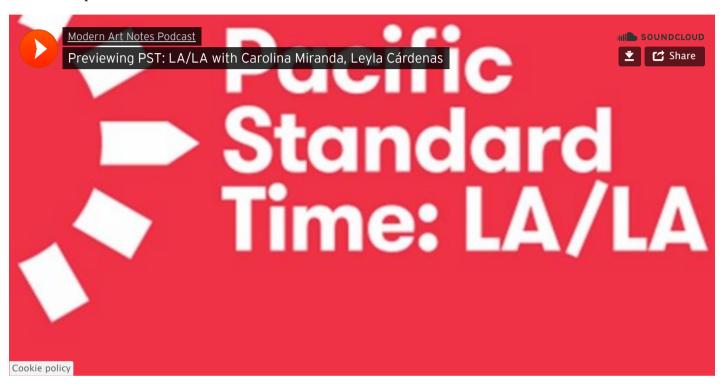

On the second segment artist <u>Leyla Cárdenas (http://www.lehila.net/)</u> discusses her recent work, especially Excision (2012), which is included in <u>"Home — So Different, So Appealing"</u> (http://www.lacma.org/art/exhibition/home-so-different-so-appealing) at the Los Angeles County Museum of

Art. It is the first PST: LA/LA show to open. Curated by Chon Noriega, Pilar Tompkins Rivas and Mari Carmen Ramirez, it will remain on view through October 15, when it will travel to the Museum of Fine Arts Houston.

Cárdenas is a Colombia-based artist whose work explores how history can be found in the physical spaces within built environments. She's had solo shows this year at her gallery in Bogota and at <u>Dimensions Variable in Miami.
