College More Than a 'Return on Investment'

Saturday's Environmental and Urban Economics highlighted a recent Washington Post op-ed by UCLA Chancellor Gene Block detailing how higher education benefits society and the ways in which students and universities help serve the larger community. Block was quoted.

Peptide Linked to Positive Emotions

United Press International reported Saturday, and Health Central reported Thursday, on a study led by Jerome Siegel, professor of psychiatry and director of the Center for Sleep Research at the Semel Institute for Neuroscience and Human Behavior at UCLA, that found that hypocretin, a peptide neurotransmitter in humans, is increased during positive experiences, suggesting it could be useful in potential treatments for depression. Siegel was quoted in the coverage.

Expansion of California's Medi-Cal

An article in Saturday's Contra Costa Times about the challenges of implementing provisions of the Affordable Care Act in California cited a study by researchers from the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research and colleagues estimating the number of state residents who will enroll in Medi-Cal when the program is expanded.

CPR Denied to Dying Elderly Woman

An article published Sunday in Florida's Sun-Sentinel about an attendant at an independent living facility in California who refused to administer CPR to a dying 87-year-old woman cited research by UCLA Health's Ethics Center, showing that most people under age 85 who undergo CPR never leave the hospital again.
