Gambling on an Oscar

NPR's "All Things Considered" and Slate reported Sunday, and Salon reported Friday, on a study by UCLA associate professor of sociology Gabriel Rossman and Oliver Schilke, a UCLA doctoral candidate in sociology, in which the researchers developed an algorithm to calculate a film's "Oscar appeal" and determined the average amount of box-office boost movies get when they receive Oscar nominations.
