UCLA's Chon Noriega has shaped our view of Chicano L.A.

The year was 1969. It was a time of social protest over eivil rights and representation issues. Those protests chocked at UCLA where Mexical improved access to higher education improved access to higher education improved access to higher reducation improved access to higher reducation come in the U.S.

Enter the university's Mexican American Cultural Center, which was established to support research in what was then the new field of Chicano studies. In the canon Studies Research Center (CSRC) – has grown from a small student- and faculty-led initiative to a full-blown academic center, supporting original research and publications, the maintenance of archival collections and a library.
